

FRANCE MAPS

The maps are provided to assist researchers with an understanding of the streets, features and surrounds when the *Lacemakers of Calais* lived there. However, the maps are an approximation and the researcher should always use them as a guide.

In 1848 the Calais region was comprised of two communes, the Commune of Calais and the Commune of St Pierre-lès-Calais. The first covered the fortified town of Calais including the citadel and the Courgain fishing community while the second covered the village of St Pierre-lès-Calais and the countryside to the east, south and west of it.

The France maps in this section are:

- Communes of Calais and St Pierre-lès-Calais circa 1848, and
- Commune of St Pierre-lès-Calais circa 1848

The first map covers both communes including roads and features within the landscape such as sea walls and dikes (digues), drains and watercourses (wattergands), canals, railway line and fortifications.

The second map is of the village of St Pierre-lès-Calais and includes the village streets and adjacent roads as the village began to encroach on its surroundings and local features including the nearby canals and windmills.

The maps show the street names noted in the various censuses made at five-year intervals up to and including 1846, two years before the upheavals of 1848. They were compiled from information shown on a series of maps of the region from the eighteenth and nineteenth century including those held and conserved by the Pas-de-Calais France archives department that can be viewed on the Pas-de-Calais Archives website http://www.archivespasdecalais.fr/Archives-en-ligne
